

SWIPCO Business Revolving Loan Fund is More Accessible Than Ever

Atlantic, IA- Starting and sustaining a business is a challenging journey. Southwest Iowa Planning Council's Business Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) aims to help business owners on that journey and RLF funds are more flexible than ever before.

The RLF was established to assist new and existing businesses create and retain jobs. RLF dollars are used in conjunction with local lenders to provide gap financing for business development and expansion. As loans are repaid into the pool, the fund revolves back out to other businesses.

The SWIPCO Policy Council recently voted to approve some regulation changes for the fund to make it easier to access. Maximum loan amounts are up from \$125,000 to \$250,000. Applicants must create or retain 1 permanent full-time job for every \$50,000 loaned, up from \$10,000. In addition to loan funds being used for operating capital and equipment, loans can now more easily be used for building and property acquisition and/ or building renovation.



The fund is available to new or expanding businesses in Cass, Fremont, Harrison, Montgomery, Page, and Shelby Counties. Applicants must demonstrate the need for gap financing or have been declined by a financial institution. The business proposal must support and enhance the regional economy and contain a business and marketing plan. Applicants must contribute at least 10% of the total project cost.

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The SWIPCO Business RLF currently has \$600,000 available to lend, with another \$350,000 currently loaned out. There are 6 active loans and 86 active jobs currently supported. Since it's inception, the RLF has loaned out \$2,182,650 and spurred the creation or retention of 197 jobs in the region. Projects have leveraged on average \$5 of private investment for every \$1 loaned out.

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Business RLF Ready to Spur Business Growth

Loans have competitive low interest rates on a 5 to 10-year term. A non-refundable application fee of \$150 will apply.

The process starts with applying with required documentation. Those applications are then reviewed by the RLF Review Board. They will evaluate and make recommendations for funding or denial of the project. The recommended projects are then acted on by the SWIPCO Policy Council. Approved projects will then begin the closing process.

Sports Bar Gets Startup Boost from SWIPCO Revolving Loan Fund



Red Oak, IA – Red Oak residents wanted a sports bar, but starting a restaurant, especially during a pandemic, can be difficult. Southwest Iowa Planning Council was able to help meet that need by funding Stadium 34, a sports bar started in 2021 in a space left vacant when the Red Coach Inn Restaurant closed during COVID.

The owner, Rocky Rocha, was loaned \$150,000 from the SWIPCO RLF to purchase restaurant equipment and furnishings. Rocha said, "We are very happy with the outcome. SWIPCO was excellent to work with and really helped me plan to make this come to life."

The restaurant filled a void for the community and Rocha said they've supported him in return, "We want to give area residents dining options and a place to gather."

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SWIPCO Addresses a Variety of Homeowner Needs With Iowa West Foundation Home Repair Grant



Unexpected expenses can be a burden that's hard to overcome. Often those expenses are very necessary, such as needing to replace a faulty furnace. Lewis resident Kenneth Griffin ran into this need a few years back and SWIPCO was able to get that replacement done by using funds from an Iowa West Foundation grant.

Kenneth originally had a local HVAC team come out and replace a venting section. While doing the work they told him that his furnace and AC units would need to be replaced soon due to some faults in the system. They recommended getting in touch with SWIPCO, so he did and was placed on a list for possible help. The furnace was able to hang on for long enough and when he eventually reached the top of the list, SWIPCO sprung into action. Work was lined up to replace the furnace and ac unit, as well as repairs to the back door.

"They were in and out with the replacement in a day. It made an immediate difference." Griffin said, "The units are much more energy efficient, and we saw the reduction in our electric and gas bills as well."

Griffin said the interactions he had with SWIPCO and the contractors were great, "It was a positive experience. Glad to get the help. I didn't see them much sometimes because of work, but they took care of everything."

Another unexpected expense for a homeowner can be foundation issues. Nick and Kelley Kinser of Elliott ran into this issue on their rural property. Runoff from a hill behind their home had started to cause bowing in their basement walls.

Kelley said she originally approached SWIPCO without telling her husband because she had a high school friend who previously received help. They were put on a list for help and after a four-year wait, which unfortunately is typical because of high demand, they got the call. They then went through a qualification and inspection process.

"It was really perfect timing as some big rains had made the issue worse. It took around two weeks to get everything prepped and then about 3 days for the work." Kinser said.

Nick and Kelley appreciated how attentive everyone was during the process. Even when there was an issue, they got a quick response, "There was an issue with the contractor billing and Matthew Lee told me not to worry and addressed it right away." Kelley said, "Sandy Hansen followed up after a couple days and updated me on everything."

They said the work was interesting to see the process and the different techniques that were implemented to support the foundation. You could tell their appreciation, "I just wish more people knew about what SWIPCO can do." Kelley said.

SWIPCO utilizes a number of different grant programs for home repair projects and qualification guidelines can vary between them. All are income based and have wait lists, so check with SWIPCO staff early to see if you qualify.



From the Desk of the Executive Director...

This month we've led our newsletter with a couple pieces about our business revolving loan fund. This is a program that SWIPCO offers that we honestly haven't promoted heavily in the past couple of years. That's primarily because some of the rules and regulations to use these funds made loans very difficult to make. Recently the SWIPCO board has been able to make some important amendments and we believe that now's a great time to put more emphasis on our loan program because those funds should be out in the community, not sitting in the bank.

That being said, sometimes I get calls regarding our loan program and what folks are really looking for is a grant—something that doesn't need to be repaid. It's important to keep in mind that most grant programs are for things that don't generate revenue (or not enough revenue to pay for themselves) but are seen as important public services/goods. For example, our grant programs to repair homes, which are also highlighted in this issue are structured as grants because the agencies that are giving us the funds to do those repairs see preserving the housing stock in our area as an important public good. Most support to businesses, like our revolving loan fund, are structured as loans because the point of a business is to have positive cash flow. So yes, we only want to make business loans to businesses that can show that they will be able to pay back the loans. The difference between us and the bank is that we are willing to take on much more risk—in fact being turned down for at least part of the loan by a bank is a requirement to be funded by us-and we can often do lower interest rates, but at the end of the day we do ask tough questions and want to have confidence that the business will succeed.

If you are looking to start or expand a business, there are a lot of resources to help. I strongly encourage anyone interested to first start with your local county economic development organization and a local banker. They are a wealth of resources and once you get their input, then let's talk and make it happen!
